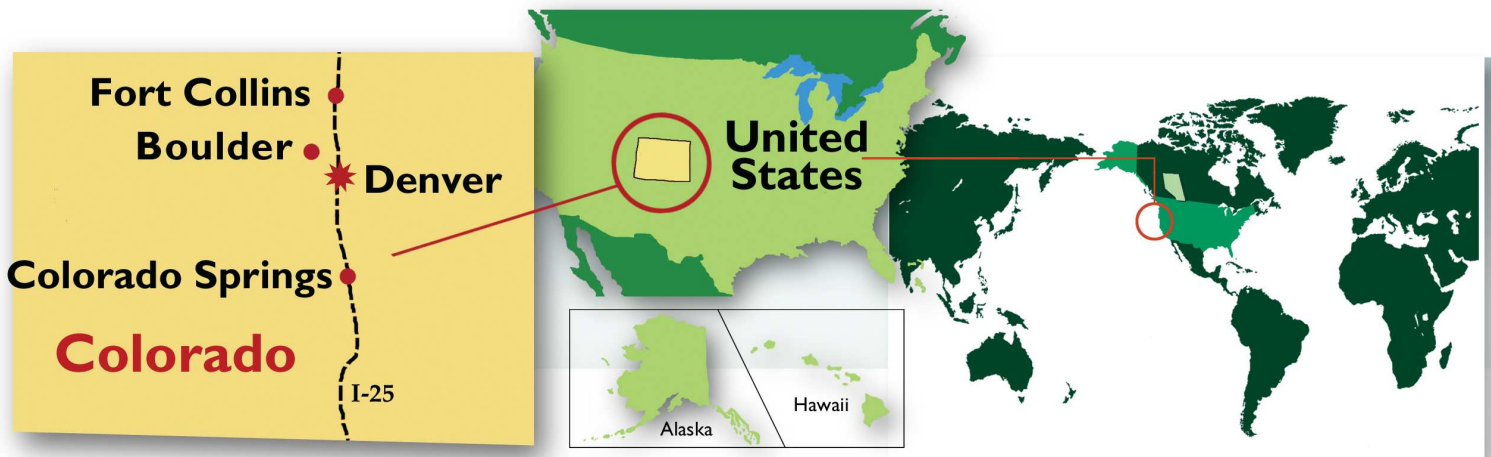

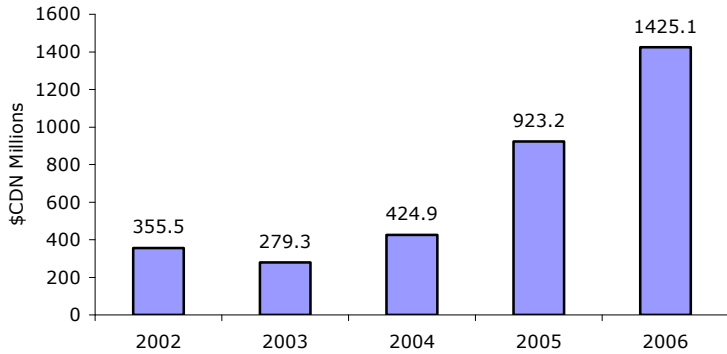
DID YOU KNOW?

- Colorado's name comes from a Spanish word meaning "red" or "ruddy," the color of much of the state's terrain.
- Colorado is known as the "Centennial State" because it joined the union 100 years after the signing of the Declaration of Independence.
- The state has 58 mountains that soar over 14,000 feet.
- During the Second World War, the US established significant military installations in Colorado. In the post-war era, Colorado Springs was selected as the site for the Air Force Academy and NORAD headquarters.
- Edmonton expat Pat Bowlen owns the Denver Broncos of the National Football League.

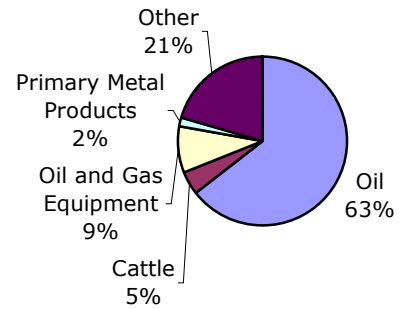
RELATIONSHIP OVERVIEW

- Alberta and Colorado share thriving mountain resort industries.
- Colorado is connected to Alberta via the I-25 highway, which eventually links with the CANAMEX Transportation Corridor in Montana.
- Large Alberta-based companies have a major presence in Colorado, including U.S. head offices for Encana and PCL Construction, as well as a large refinery in Denver owned by Suncor.

TRADE AND INVESTMENTS

- Colorado is Alberta's 15th largest export market in the U.S. in 2006.
- Alberta exports to Colorado grew significantly reaching \$1.4 billion in 2006 due to an increase in the shipment of crude oil.
- Other main exports to Colorado include oil and gas equipment and beef.
- Alberta imports from Colorado totaled more than \$176 million in 2006 and included products such as heavy petroleum oil, curtains, and machinery parts.

ENERGY

- Colorado has the second highest percentage of homes heated with natural gas in the United States, with a market share of almost 75 percent.
- Colorado has large tracts of oil shale lands estimated to contain several billion barrels of recoverable crude oil, which are not commercially recoverable at this time.
- Colorado sees potential opportunities to process oil from Alberta's oil sands at existing refineries in the state.

EMERGING OPPORTUNITIES

- Business and finance services and telecommunications are the leading sectors in GSP growth.
- Colorado is home to Qwest Communications International, Level 3 Communications, Intel Corporation, AT&T and Celestica Corporation Multimedia & film.

- August 2006: Minister Mar lead an Alberta delegation to the CSG-West Annual meeting in Breckenridge, Colorado.

- April 2005: Governor Owens and Denver Mayor Hickenlooper visited Alberta on an energy partnering mission. Over 50 participants traveled to Alberta for the event.

- Canada opened a Consulate General in Denver in the fall of 2004, as part of its enhanced representation initiative in the U.S. The Consul General is Mr. Michael Fine.
